Word from the Priest-in-charge

Having said goodbye to Alison Shaw in August 2022, the inevitable vacancy loomed large, knowing that these can take at least a year if not longer to resolve; for some it can take several years and attempts to find a suitable candidate. Financial Report

Introduction

I'd like to thank Sue, Heather and Rosemary for their backup when I'm not around for "Sunday duties"; also John for his essential help in keeping our Excel spreadsheet in fully working order. We are also very grateful to Shirley and Caroline who, with others, work so hard to ensure the success of our Christmas Tree Festival, enjoyed as always by a large attendance from far and wide.

Church Income & Expenditure

The average congregation size has settled at a consistently lower level (about 20% down) than in pre-Covid times but the Parish Giving Scheme has again helped to minimise the effect on income. Thanks to all those who opt for their

annual increase in contributions to be inflation-linked, particularly in a year when inflation was higher than we have become used to. Despite this, income this year was £2100 less than 2022, but because expenditure on major items such as fabric repairs has been unusually low, income has exceeded expenditure, for the first time in three years, by £4972. A greater number of weddings also contributed to this and the Christmas Tree Festival made its usual major contribution.

It is also good to note that our charitable giving to various organisations ranging from Devon Historic

Churches through, among others, Mary's Meals, a water improvement project in Ghana and Dartmouth Caring to the Seamen's Mission amounted to almost £3000.

Major Maintenance and Enhancement Projects

Essential preparatory work on the updated servery/disabled toilet project (including advice from the Diocesan Advisory Committee, the Church's equivalent of planning permission) has been progressed to the point where tenders are about to be sought for implementation of the project. So far, the cost has come from current reserves, but we expect to need to seek grants from suitable bodies to finalise completion. I'm pleased to report that we seem to have a sufficiently large sum in our investment account to ensure we have at least the likely requisite minimum contribution of our own. It's also likely that the water ingress to the Tower mentioned last year will need attention this year having had little progress during 2023. As always we are grateful to the Friends of St Peters (FOSP) for their active support on projects of this nature.

Financial Planning for 2024

With prevailing interest rates being at their present levels, it's apparent that we need to earn more interest on the funds we have, than we have been doing in 2023. Accordingly we will be closing the Tower account and switching its amount to the Church of England Deposit Account in which most of our current "savings" are currently held. The amount switched will be "reserved" for ongoing spending on the Tower, but this does not justify any longer a separate account. It's likely that a considerable portion of our other current account will also be so invested, as funds can be accessed at two days' notice if needed urgently.

Churchwarden's Report

New Priest Appointed

In August, the Rev. Matt Gorton was appointed as the new Priest in Charge of the Coast and Country Benefice. He and is family are living at the Rectory here in Stoke Fleming and we are pleased to welcome them to the village.

Church Building Maintenance

In March Paul Daniels, the electrician, carried out the five yearly routine testing of the church electrical installation.

In August Peter Bailey fitted a new frame to the door on to the tower roof from the stone steps. The original frame had decayed in the severe weather conditions occurring at the top of the tower.

Also in August Western Lightning, of Ilsington, Newton Abbot, fitted a lightning conductor to the flagpole, carried out work to the rest of the lightning conductor system, repaired a bearing on the weathervane and replaced two slates in the north west tower louvre.

The tower clock had its annual service by the Cumbria Clock Company.

In December the electrician replaced one of the remaining old light fittings in the North Aisle with a new LED fitting.

Just before Christmas a leak appeared in the water pipe running around the south side of the church to feed the kitchen and toilet. That was repaired but another, much smaller leak remains and is yet to be located.

Throughout the year discussions have been taking place between the PCC, representatives from FOSP and the church architect, Julie Boultby, regarding the proposed servery and alterations to the toilet at the south west corner of the church. Drawings are now being finalised in preparation for applying for faculty permission from the Diocese.

Churchyard

After several years of regularly cutting the grass in the north churchyard, Ian Forsythe has given up the work, and it has now been taken over by Christopher Reeve, the contractor who cuts the grass in the main part of the yard on the south side.

In March, the hedge along the north wall of the yard was cut back, in part paid for by FoSP and partly by the PCC. It had become overgrown with a thick mass



of brambles and the considerable quantity of cut vegetation was removed by volunteers from the Living Churchyard group. The area in the north east triangle, formed by the path from the war memorial to the east end of the church, and back to the north east corner, is being looked after and cut by the Living Churchyard group.

Organists

Our band of regular organists, Mike Dodsworth, Carol Warboys, Janet Dietz and Karen White, between them continued to play for all our services. We are grateful to Mike for playing on the first Sunday of every month for no charge.

Bellringing

We continue to ring the bells regularly for services and weekly practices, thanks to our faithful team of ringers. We now have eight active regular ringers living in the village.

Unlocking and Locking the Church

Jenny Harris undertakes the unlocking of the church every morning, and Peter and Anne Bailey lock it again in the evenings.

Finally, to anyone who does anything for the church, be it great or small, but who I may have forgotten to mention, please accept my apologies and my sincere thanks.

To celebrate at the end of the school year the Mums organized a splendid picnic in the village playpark on Monday, July 17th. There were cake and pastries as well as coffee and tea. The weather was ideal. sunny but not too hot; there was a big

turnout; the children had a great time playing and the adults talking.

Numbers peaked at a dozen children in early September before some of the older children moved on to Little Lanterns at School. They, and other older siblings whom we now enjoy seeing for OtB at School, returned in force and with great enthusiasm on a 'non-pupil' day when we had a very lively session with 21 children. The Little Stars Christmas Tree, organized by the Mums, featured gingerbread men designs with the children's faces.



Friends of St Peter's



In early spring the dwarf daffodils alongside the paths to the church gave a wonderful display which was greatly enjoyed; the efforts of the *Living Churchyard Team*, sponsored by FoSP, in planning, procuring and planting the bulbs the previous December were much appreciated. The Team, co-ordinated by Jenny

Hailstone, also did sterling work clearing brambles along the north side of the churchyard and raking up the strimmed grass. Leaving the area unstrimmed during the summer, apart from regularly mowed grass paths, resulted in an eye-catching array of ox-eye daisies.



In April David Curry, the Diocesan expert on churchyards, was the speaker at the



first of what FoSP plans to be a series of 'soirées'. Refreshments were served at the back of church and after a fascinating illustrated talk on 'Managing God's Acre: Why are Churchyards so Important for Wildlife' many of the audience moved to the Green

Dragon for supper with a special discount for ticket holders.

A number of surveys of the churchyard fauna and flora were completed (full details available at www.fospstokefleming.com). For instance in September a bat survey used sophisticated recording equipment loaned by the Devon Wildlife Trust, with the results uploaded to a sound identification program run by the British Trust for Ornithology. This revealed the presence of 13 species of bat including several very rare ones such as the Grey Long-eared Bat. In July some of the children in their Forest School lessons made a number of 'bug hotels' and it will be interesting to see how these are colonised. A 'story-telling' seat with a semi-circle of tree trunk seats is actively planned.

Several members of the FoSP Committee have contributed greatly to the ongoing project to create an accessible toilet (complete with baby changing space) using more of the present kitchen, together with a new servery in the back corner of the church; progress has been slow but FoSP hopes that official permission for this, and for the renewal of the churchyard path from the war memorial to Coffin Way, may be forthcoming soon.

Rotary generously agreed to match fund the amount given to *Shelterbox*. St Peter's Church also received £1,100. There were approximately thirty requests for a card machine as less people seemed to be carrying cash and I am hopeful that the PCC will be able to provide one next year to generate much needed revenue for the upcoming Church projects.

The Prayer Tree was hugely colourful from the first day due to the efforts of the Stoke Fleming Primary School who prepared their wishes and prayers in advance and brought them along on the opening day.

Shelterbox provided a very striking presentation which included an actual Shelterbox with all essentials which are so important to people in need throughout the World. Great support was received from Rotary members who were on hand throughout the festival to answer any Shelterbox related questions visitors may have had. Sadly, Shirley, having worked so hard, was



unable to attend due to being unwell and was sorely missed!
